4-H/FFA GENERAL RULES*

- <u>NON-PERISHABLE</u> indoor exhibits will be entered Tuesday, July 11 from 4:30 p.m. to 6:30 p.m. <u>PERISHABLE</u> indoor exhibits will be entered Thursday, July 13 from 6:30 p.m.–8:00 p.m. or Friday, July 14 from 8:00 a.m. to 9:00 a.m. "Perishable" refers to baked goods, vegetables and fruit, and fresh flowers. Note: These are NOT livestock entry times. See the fair schedule and livestock sections for livestock entry dates and times.
- 4-H/FFA Division entries will be limited to Talbot County 4-H/FFA members.
 4-H members from other counties may enter in Open Classes. (See the Open Classes fair book.)
- 3. <u>ALL</u> entries for Talbot County 4-H clovers (ages 5–7 as of January 1) go in Department O Clover. Clover entries will receive participation awards only and will not be judged competitively.
- 4. Only work completed since August 1 of last year may be exhibited.
- 5. Exhibits must be the work of the exhibitor and entered in his or her name.
- A 4-H member may only exhibit in classes for his/her age level (use age as of January 1 of this year). Clover, ages 5–7; Junior, ages 8–10; Intermediate, ages 11–13; Senior, ages 14–18
 Age of exhibitor is determined as of January 1 of the current year.
- 7. 4-H members are responsible for **securely** attaching entry tags to exhibits. Entry tags will be available at the Talbot County University of Maryland Extension Office approximately one week prior to entry.
- 8. PARENTS MUST PROVIDE SUPERVISION FOR 4-H/FFA MEMBERS DURING THE FAIR OR ARRANGE FOR ANOTHER PARENT/ADULT TO SUPERVISE THEM. DO NOT JUST DROP OFF YOUR CHILDREN WITHOUT ARRANGING FOR SUPERVISION.
- 9. The Talbot Agriculture and Education Center, University of Maryland Extension, and the Talbot County Fair will not be responsible for items damaged or stolen. Exhibitors participate at their own risk. The Talbot County Fair does not carry insurance on exhibits.
- 10. Indoor exhibit judging will be carried out according to the Danish System. Each blue, red, and white award will receive premium money depending on available funds. Premiums are subject to change without notice.
- 11. The decisions of judges are final and may not be contested. Champion and Reserve Champion will be awarded based on outstanding merit and at the discretion of judges.
- 12. If an article has been entered previously and you wish to enter the same item again, attach a statement of change or improvement. This change or improvement is what will be judged.
- 13. No entry will be accepted unless there is a specific class for it in the fair book.
- 14. All Talbot 4-H indoor exhibits must remain on grounds until 8:00 p.m., Saturday, July 15 or released under special circumstances by indoor exhibit chairperson. Violators will result in forfeit of premiums. Fair indoor exhibits award checks (if available) will be presented Saturday, July 15 at approximately 6:00 p.m.

2023 MARYLAND ANIMAL HEALTH FAIR AND SHOW REQUIREMENTS Ref: COMAR 15.11.14.06

Effective: January 1, 2023

The Maryland Department of Agriculture's (MDA), Animal Health Program strives to safeguard Maryland's animal industries at our fairs and shows. With an increased potential of disease transmission occurring when large numbers of animals gather for exhibition, MDA has set forth requirements for exhibitors to follow at Maryland fairs and shows. As an exhibitor, you can help reduce the potential risk of introduction and spread of infectious and/or contagious diseases by following the species-specific health requirements below.

IMPORTANT 2023 ANIMAL HEALTH REQUIREMENTS TO MENTION:

- 1. CERTIFICATES OF VETERINARY INSPECTION (CVI):
 - The accredited veterinarian is required to send the original (white and canary) copies to MDA Headquarters within 7 days of completion.
- 2. LIVESTOCK:
 - All cattle and swine must have an EID (electronic identification) or RFID (radio frequency identification) 840 tag. Cattle and swine with non-electronic ID tags will be dismissed upon entry.
 - All sheep and goats must have Scrapie Identification in the form of an official Scrapie Identification tag, or a legible and healed tattoo matching identification on breed registration paperwork.
 - Livestock petting zoos and pony rides will be allowed with proper CVI, indicating rabies vaccination status, and self-certification documents.
- 3. POULTRYAVIAN INFLUENZA TESTING:
 - All in- state poultry must be tested for avian influenza within <u>30 days</u> prior to the exhibition or originate from an NPIP U.S. H5/H7 Avian Influenza Clean flock.
 - All out-of-state poultry must be tested for avian influenza within <u>21 days</u> prior to the exhibition or originate from an NPIP U.S. H5/H7 Avian Influenza Clean flock.

Maryland Law provides penalties for violations of Animal Health Law and Regulations. LIVESTOCK AND POULTRY FAILING TO MEET COMPLETE DOCUMENTATION OF ALL REQUIREMENTS WILL BE DENIED ENTRY OR REMOVED FROM THE EXHIBITION, "REJECTED". SEE ANIMAL REJECTION POLICY UNDER GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR EXHIBITORS.



REQUIREMENTS FOR SPONSORS OF A LIVESTOCK/POULTRY EXHIBITION (COMAR 15.11.14.05)

- Notification: Exhibit sponsors must notify the Maryland Department of Agriculture (MDA), Animal Health Program Headquarters, 50 Harry S. Truman Parkway, Annapolis, MD 21401, of intent to sponsor an event that includes the exhibition of livestock or poultry no less than 30 days before the proposed event. Please fill out all contact information correctly, to include a phone number and email address. Animal arrival times MUST be provided to ensure coverage for entry. Please call 410-841-5810 to request an EXHIBITION NOTIFICATION FORM or go to MDA's website: http://mda.maryland.gov/animalhealth/pages/fairs -shows.aspx
- Reporting: Sponsors must report to the Department any animal from the exhibition suspected of having or showing obvious, apparent, or known signs of a contagious or infectious disease and/or deaths; and exclude from the exhibition premises any animals having obvious, apparent, or known signs of a contagious or infectious disease. A summary of all disease events shall be provided to MDA, in the form of an ANIMAL INCIDENT REPORT. Call 410-841-5810 to request an ANIMAL INCIDENT REPORT FORM or go to MDA's website: <u>http://mda.maryland.gov/AnimalHealth/Pages/ Fairs-Shows.aspx</u>
- Records: Exhibit sponsors must maintain a report of the owner, premises location, and species of all animals attending the exhibition and provide this report upon request to MDA.
- 4. Exemptions: Exemptions of this regulation may be granted. (Refer to COMAR 15.11.14.05)

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR EXHIBITORS OF ALL ANIMAL SPECIES (COMAR 15.11.14.04-06)

Exhibitors at state, county, and district fairs, along with other livestock exhibitions, expositions, rodeos, shows, and swap meets are required to comply with regulatory provisions of the State of Maryland relating to animal health as noted in COMAR 15.11.14.04-06. Requirements apply to all livestock and poultry: Livestock is defined as those species of animals used for human food or fiber or those species of animals used for service to humans. This includes but is not limited to cattle, sheep, New World camelids (llamas & alpacas), goats, bison, privately owned cervids, swine, equine, and rabbits. Livestock does not include dogs, cats, and exotic pets. Poultry is defined as any living domestic bird raised for food or other purposes including, but not limited to, chicken, turkeys, ostriches, emus, rheas, cassowaries, other ratites, waterfowl, and game birds.

 DOCUMENTATION: Documentation is required for entry of all livestock and poultry and is described below. Examples of forms can be obtained by visiting the Animal Health website at: <u>http://mda.maryland.gov/animalhealth/pages/fairs -shows.aspx</u>
 For out-of-state animals, see species specific out of state requirements. Upon request, a person who exhibits livestock shall present for inspection all reports, test charts, and appropriate health certificates required to accompany the livestock and poultry.



2. CERTIFICATE OF VETERINARY INSPECTION is required for most entries.

- MARYLAND ENTRIES: All Maryland entries must be accompanied by a Maryland Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) for show, except poultry, equine and rabbits.
 - The Maryland CVI is valid for 120 days for fairs and shows, providing that the status of the herd or animal(s) does not change.
 - The Maryland CVI is a legible record, made on an official Maryland State form, issued by a Maryland accredited veterinarian, issued for animals being shown within the state and not crossing a state line, which shows that the animals listed thereon meet the health requirements of the state of Maryland.
 - The Maryland CVI must be completed and signed by a Maryland accredited veterinarian using the proper selected report on the CVI form. Each animal must be properly identified on the CVI. The veterinarian must select if this document is for fair and exhibition season, sale or other (with explanation).
 - The veterinarian is required to send the original (white and canary) copies to MDA Headquarters within 7 days of completion, the middle (pink) transport copy is to be retained by the owner and should accompany livestock during travel. The last (goldenrod) copy is for the veterinarian's records.
- OUT-OF-STATE ENTRIES: All out-of-state entries must be accompanied by an Interstate Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, except poultry and rabbits.
 - The Interstate CVI is valid for no more than 30 days from the date of inspection.
 - An Interstate CVI must be legible, made on an official form of the state of origin, issued by an
 accredited veterinarian, and issued for animals being imported to this state within 30 days before
 the entry of the animals, which shows that the animals listed thereon meet the health
 requirements of the state of Maryland.
- SELF-CERTIFICATION: A completed Self-Certification is required for all entries except for equine entering equine-only events.

Self-Certification forms must be filled out within 24 hours prior to loading and presented upon request to the designated representative.

- A Self-Certification is an official Maryland document signed by the owner/caretaker/ transporter stating that the animals presented for exhibition are not showing any signs of or having recent exposure to (within 21 days) infectious or contagious diseases.
- Self-Certification forms are species-specific for livestock (ruminants, swine), equine, poultry and rabbits. These forms are available on MDA's Animal Health website: http://mda.maryland.gov/animalhealth/pages/fairs-shows.aspx
- TEST REPORT FORMS. Testing is required for some species, and if so, a test report form will be required unless otherwise documented on the CVI. See species-specific requirements for details of testing and test report requirements.

- MARYLAND POULTRY PREMISES IDENTIFICATION All Maryland premises with poultry are required to be registered with the Maryland Department of Agriculture. The Poultry Premises number must be noted on the Test Report or other documentation of NPIP U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid and U.S. H5/ H7 Avian Influenza Clean or State H5/H7 Monitored status.
- ANIMAL REJECTION POLICY. Animals may be rejected from an exhibition, either denied entry or removed from the exhibition, as described below:
 - a. FAILURE TO PROVIDE COMPLETED DOCUMENTATION IS GROUNDS FOR REJECTION.
 - b. FOR A SKIN LESION SUSPICIOUS OF RINGWORM TO BE CONSIDERED NO LONGER CONTAGIOUS TO OTHER ANIMALS OR PEOPLE, NEW WOOL OR HAIR MUST COMPLETELY COVER THAT LESION.
 - c. Livestock with clinical signs of infectious or contagious diseases or external parasites are not permitted entry or allowed to remain at the exhibition. Clinical signs include but are not limited to: active lesions of ringworm with resulting loss of hair, sore mouth, sore nose, caseous lymphadenitis, mange, or multiple warts easily visible without close examination.
 - d. Suspicion of communicable disease is adequate grounds for rejection. Confirmed diagnosis is not required, since timely removal of suspicious animals is required by law to protect the remaining animals.
 - e. Exposed animals may be rejected: If it is believed that there is a potentially serious communicable disease present, all animals originating with the suspect animal may be rejected. Vesicular diseases are of particular concern.
 - f. All decisions are final.
 - g. All parties involved will be notified of all rejections, including exhibit sponsors and supervisors.
 - h. Animal rejections can be made by MDA Animal Health veterinarians or field inspectors, private veterinarians contracted by the show, Maryland Extension employees, or individuals designated by the fair or show as a 'responsible person.'

SPECIES-SPECIFIC REQUIREMENTS

In addition to the general requirements above, specific requirements by species are shown for the following species:

Goats	Camelids

Fair and Show Requirements: Cattle

ALL CATTLE

IDENTIFICATION: INDIVIDUAL IDENTIFICATION OF EACH ANIMAL SHALL BE AN RFID OFFICIAL EAR TAG.

Rodeo Cattle must have official individual ID that is recognized by the USDA. Rodeo Cattle are NOT allowed to commingle with any other cattle at the exhibition.



Maryland Department of Agriculture

Maryland Cattle

Brucellosis: Maryland is a Bovine Brucellosis Class-Free State. Brucellosis testing is not required for Maryland cattle.

<u>Tuberculosis</u>: Maryland is an Accredited Tuberculosis-Free State. Tuberculin test is not required for Maryland cattle.

Immunization: Bovine Respiratory Disease Complex vaccination is required for all Maryland cattle to include Bovine Respiratory Syncytial Virus, Bovine Viral Diarrhea virus, Infectious Bovine Rhinotracheitis and Parainfluenza. Leptospirosis vaccination is recommended.

Out-of-State Cattle

Brucellosis:

- 1. Bovine Brucellosis Class-Free State, Region or Zone
 - a. No brucellosis test required.
- 2. Non-Bovine Brucellosis Class-Free State, Region or Zone
 - a. Official vaccinates under 24 months old with vaccination dates recorded on the Interstate CVI permitted, or
 - b. Test negative within 30 days before entry.

Tuberculosis:

- 1. Accredited Tuberculosis-Free State, Region or Zone
 - a. No tuberculin test required.
- 2. Modified Accredited Advanced or lower Tuberculosis Free Areas or States (Not TB Free)
 - a. All cattle over 6 months of age shall comply with the following:
 - Cattle must originate from a herd where a complete herd test was conducted within the past 12 months; progeny from such herds born since that test may be imported without a tuberculin test, or
 - Any individual animal, over 6 months of age, entering Maryland must have a negative tuberculin test within 60 days before import.
 - b. Status of herd and area must be shown on certificate.

Fair and Show Requirements: Swine

ALL SWINE

IDENTIFICATION: INDIVIDUAL IDENTIFICATION OF EACH ANIMAL SHALL BE AN RFID OFFICIAL EAR TAG.

Maryland Swine

Brucellosis: Maryland is a Brucellosis Class-Free State. Brucellosis testing is not required for Maryland swine.



<u>Pseudorabies</u>: Maryland is a Pseudorabies Stage V state. Pseudorabies testing is not required for Maryland swine.

Immunization: Leptospirosis vaccination is recommended.

Out-of-State Swine

<u>Brucellosis</u>: All swine, except barrows, 6 months of age and older shall be negative on an official test for brucellosis within 30 days prior to exhibition entry, *or* originate directly from a validated brucellosis-free herd or brucellosis-free state.

<u>Pseudorabies</u>: Swine over 6 months of age shall be negative on an official test for pseudorabies conducted within 30 days prior to exhibition entry, *or* originate immediately and directly from a Qualified Pseudorabies Negative herd or Stage 4 or Stage 5 Pseudorabies-Free State.

Immunization: Leptospirosis vaccination is recommended.

Fair and Show Requirements: Sheep and Goats

ALL SHEEP

Identification for Sheep: All sheep must be officially scrapie-identified. Official identification for sheep includes the following:

- 1. USDA-approved scrapie ear tags;
- Legible registration tattoos, for which the breed registration paper shall contain the registry premises or flock tattoo prefix that is linked to the APHIS-assigned PIN and flock ID number of the flock of birth, if breed registry is approved by APHIS; or
- Legible tattoos consisting of an individual animal number unique within the flock in one ear and the official scrapie premises identification number (flock ID) in the other ear, except where the tail web or flank may be used for earless animals or animals with damaged ears; must be accompanied by an owner statement.
- 4. A microchip ID with official scrapie identification is acceptable if the owner provides the reader.
- 5. RFID tags.

Out-of-State Sheep

No additional requirements.

Market Lambs

It is recommended that all lambs be slick shorn prior to entry for inspection for club lamb fungus.

ALL GOATS

Identification for Goats: All goats must be officially scrapie-identified. Official identification for goats includes the following:

- 1. USDA-approved scrapie ear tags;
- Legible registration tattoos, for which the breed registration paper shall contain the registry premises or flock tattoo prefix that is linked to the APHIS-assigned PIN and flock ID number of the flock of birth, if breed registry is approved by APHIS; or
- 3. Legible tattoos consisting of an individual animal number unique within the herd in one ear and the official scrapie premises identification number (flock ID) in the other ear, except where the tail web or flank may be used for earless animals or animals with damaged ears; must be accompanied by an owner statement.
- 4. A microchip ID with official scrapie identification is acceptable if the owner provides the reader.
- 5. RFID tags.

Maryland Goats

Brucellosis: Maryland is a Brucellosis Class-Free State. Brucellosis testing is not required for Maryland goats.

<u>Tuberculosis</u>: Maryland is an Accredited Tuberculosis-Free State. Tuberculin test is not required for Maryland goats.

Out-of-State Goats Tuberculosis:

- 1. Accredited Tuberculosis-Free States, Region or Zone: No tuberculin test required.
- 2. Modified Accredited Advanced or lower Tuberculosis Free Areas or States (Not TB Free)
 - a. All goats over 6 months of age shall comply with the following:
 - Goats must originate from herds in which all animals are tested negative within the past 12 months; progeny from such herds born since that test, may be imported without a tuberculin test, or
 - any individual animal entering Maryland must have a negative tuberculin test within 60 days before import.
 - b. Status of herd and area must be shown on certificate.



Fair and Show Requirements: Horses, Ponies, Mules and Other Equidae

ALL EQUINE

<u>Identification</u>: Individual official identification shall include the following as applicable: EIA test report with photo or drawing of the animal, tattoo, brand, or microchip. *Animals using tattoos or brands for official identification must be accompanied with the breed registration papers.*

Equine Infectious Anemia (Coggins) Testing: All equine for exhibition shall be accompanied by a valid Coggins Test done within 12 months prior to exhibition entry.

<u>Self-Certification Requirement and Exemption</u>: *Exhibitor's Self Certification of Animal Health* is required for each equine entering a fair/show-type event where multiple livestock species are present. The form must be available for inspection if requested. Those participating in equine-only shows and events are exempt from this requirement; however, it is good practice to thoroughly double check the health and skin condition of the animal before departing for the event. The form provides an easy checklist to do this. Exhibitors may not bring an animal having apparent or known signs of a contagious or infectious disease to a show.

Maryland Equine

- All horses and other Equidae, 9 months of age and older, shall be accompanied by a negative test for equine infectious anemia (EIA) made within the 12 months before the date of the event. A copy of this test shall accompany every animal.
- 2. A Maryland CVI is not required for Maryland equine.

Out-of-State Equine

- All horses and other Equidae, 9 months of age and older, shall be accompanied by a negative test for equine infectious anemia (EIA) made within the 12 months before the date of the event. A copy of this test shall accompany every animal.
- All horses and other Equidae shall be accompanied by a CVI issued within 30 days prior to entry. An

Interstate CVI must be legible, made on an official form from the state of origin, issued by an accredited veterinarian, and issued for animals being imported to this state within 30 days before the entry of the animals, which shows that the animals listed thereon meet the health requirements of the state of Maryland.

Fair and Show Requirements: Poultry

ALL POULTRY

- PRIVATE SALES WILL BE ALLOWED WITH PROPER DOCUMENTATION OF THE SALE BY THE EXHIBITION SPONSOR AND MAINTAINED FOR ONE YEAR.
- 2. IDENTIFICATION: Poultry entering an exhibition shall be identified with a numbered leg or wing band.



Maryland Department of Agriculture

- ALL POULTRY EXHIBITORS SHALL COMPLETE A POULTRY EXHIBITOR'S SELF-CERTIFICATION OF ANIMAL HEALTH.
- DOCUMENTATION of test results must be provided on MDA-E06 and MDA-E20, VS Form 9-2, VS Form 9-3 or comparable form approved by the State Veterinarian.

Maryland Poultry

- Premises Registration: All poultry exhibitors originating from Maryland must have valid proof of a registered Maryland Poultry Premises ID Number.
- Avian Influenza (AI) Testing Requirements: All poultry, including wild birds except pigeons and doves, shown at public exhibitions in this state shall meet one of the following AI testing requirements:
 - Originate directly from an NPIP U.S. H5/H7 Avian Influenza Clean Flock as defined in Title 9
 of the Code of Federal Regulations, or from a State Avian Influenza Monitored Flock as defined
 by the state of origin, OR.
 - ii. Have a negative avian influenza test conducted on at least <u>15 birds</u> from their flock (or <u>complete flock if fewer than 15 birds</u>) within <u>30 days</u> prior to event and remain segregated from all birds of unknown or positive avian influenza test status.
- Salmonella Pullorum-Typhoid Testing Requirements: All poultry, except waterfowl, wild birds, pigeons and doves, shown at public exhibitions in this state shall meet one or more of the following requirements:
 - Originate directly from an NPIP U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid Clean flock as defined in Title 9 of the Code of Federal Regulations (and there was no break in the chain of ownership by NPIP participants), OR
 - Have a negative official test for Salmonella Pullorum-Typhoid within 90 days before fair, exhibition, exposition, or show and remain segregated from all poultry of unknown or positive Salmonella Pullorum-Typhoid test status.

Out-of- State Poultry

- <u>Avian Influenza (AI) Testing Requirements:</u> All poultry, including wild birds except pigeons and doves, shown at public exhibitions in this state shall meet one of the following AI testing requirements:
 - Originate directly from an NPIP U.S. H5/H7 Avian Influenza Clean Flock as defined in Title 9 of the Code of Federal Regulations, or from a State Avian Influenza Monitored Flock as defined by the state of origin, OR.
 - Have a negative avian influenza test conducted on at least <u>30 birds</u> from their flock (or complete <u>flock if fewer than 30 birds</u>) within <u>21 days</u> prior to the event and remain segregated from all birds of unknown or positive avian influenza test status.
- Salmonella Pullorum-Typhoid Testing Requirements: All poultry except waterfowl, wild birds, pigeons and doves shown at public exhibitions in this state shall meet one or more of the following requirements:
 - Originate directly from a U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid Clean flock as defined in Title 9 of the Code of Federal Regulations (and there was no break in the chain of ownership by NPIP participants), OR.
 - Have a negative official test for Salmonella Pullorum-Typhoid within 90 days before fair, exhibition, exposition, or show and remain segregated from all poultry of unknown or positive Salmonella Pullorum-Typhoid test status.



Fair and Show Requirements: Rabbits

ALL RABBITS

- 1. See Rabbit Waiver: Rabbits are not required to have a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.
- Identification: Individual identification of each animal shall be a tag, tattoo, or microchip, if the exhibitor provides the reader.
- 3. All rabbit exhibitors shall complete a Rabbit Exhibitor's Self Certification of Animal Health.

Maryland and Out-of-State Rabbits

No additional requirements.

Fair and Show Requirements: Camelids

ALL CAMELIDS

Identification: Individual identification of each animal shall be an official metal ear tag or microchip, if the exhibitor provides the reader.

Maryland Camelids

Brucellosis: Brucellosis testing is not required for Maryland camelids. Tuberculosis: Tuberculin test is not required for Maryland camelids.

Out-Of-State Camelids

Brucellosis: Brucellosis testing is not required for out-of-state camelids.

Tuberculosis:

- 1. Accredited Tuberculosis-Free State, Region, or Zone
 - a. No tuberculin test required.
- 2. Modified Accredited Advanced or lower Tuberculosis Free Areas or States (Not TB Free)
 - a. All camelids over 6 months of age shall comply with the following:
 - Camelids must originate from a herd not under restriction or quarantine for tuberculosis and from which a complete herd test was conducted within the past 12 months; progeny from such herds born since that test may be imported without a tuberculin test, or
 - Any individual animal, over 6 months of age, entering Maryland must have a negative tuberculin test within 60 days before import.
 - b. Status of herd and area must be shown on certificate.

One of the top priorities of Maryland 4-H is ensuring that animals involved in 4-H projects are treated humanely, receive proper care, and (if they are to enter the food supply) are safe to eat. In an effort to make sure that all 4-H members receive the same information, Maryland 4-H requires members who complete animal science project to online animal husbandry and quality assurance training.

All 4-H members who exhibit alpacas, cattle, goats, horses, llamas, poultry, rabbits, sheep, and swine are *REQUIRED* to complete the online training as a requirement for entering animals in fairs and shows. You are required to complete the training *every year that you change age levels* (junior to intermediate, intermediate to senior) *AND every year that you begin working with a new animal species* Juniors complete the introductory module; intermediates and seniors complete the introductory module for the individual species you are working with. (Talbot County 4-H and FFA Only) GENERAL RULES - See individual show descriptions below for livestock entry dates and times.

- 1. All purebred animals for exhibition must be owned and registered in the exhibitor's name by the dates specified by Maryland 4-H.
- 2. Unregistered (grade) animals may only be exhibited by Talbot 4-H/FFA members.
- 3. To be eligible to receive awards, members must exhibit an approved animal and keep animal clean and attractive at all times during the Fair. Superintendents reserve the right of ruling on these provisions.
- 4. All entries are subject to regulations of the Maryland Department of Ag. Animal Health Division.
- 5. Livestock entries at the Fairgrounds must be accompanied by current <u>certificate of veterinary</u> <u>inspection, Maryland 4-H self-certification form</u> (complete self-certification at home the before loading to go to the fair), <u>proof of any required testing and immunization</u>, and <u>any required</u> <u>registration papers</u>. All required documents must be presented BEFORE livestock is unloaded.
- 6. No more than 2 animals may be entered in a class by the same exhibitor.
- 7. All animals must be shown by their owners except where the member has two entries in one class, in which case the second animal must be shown by another 4-H or FFA member.
- 8. In the event that livestock classes of similar nature do not have sufficient entries to warrant individual competition, the classes may be combined.
- 9. These points will be considered for fitting and showmanship classes:
- a. Fitting of Animals
 - 1. Body condition—This includes quality of the hide and general condition of the animal. Overconditioned animals should receive slight to serious discrimination.
 - 2. Grooming. Includes cleanliness of animal; proper clipping; smooth, well-polished horns; welltrimmed feet and a glossy coat of hair. Improperly groomed animals should receive discrimination
 - b. Performance in Show Ring
 - 1. Performance of animals—Animals should stop, start, and post in satisfactory manner.
 - 2. Presentation of animals—A good showman minimizes minor faults of an animal.
 - 3. Ability to show animals other than own—Good showmen are at ease when handling any properly trained animal.
 - 4. Alertness of showman—Doing the right thing at the right time is important. (Follow judge's instructions.)
 - 5. Sportsmanship of showman—Includes courtesy.
 - 6. Personal appearance of showman—A neat personal appearance helps to round out good showmanship.
 - 7. Established uniform dress for Dairy, Dairy Goats and Dairy Steers—4-H boys and girls must wear white trousers/skirts and white shirt with green or black tie; Beef, Sheep, Swine—4-H boys, khaki or green trousers, khaki or white shirt with green or black tie; 4-H girls, white shirt, green or white skirt/slacks/culottes with green or black neck piece. A khaki outfit is also acceptable.
- 10. Exhibitors must be neatly dressed when showing an animal.
- 11. Each livestock exhibitor is responsible for bringing straw or shavings and cleaning his or her stalls before leaving the fairgrounds.
- 12. If a livestock exhibitor needs to stay overnight, they must receive prior approval from parents, the Talbot County Fair Superintendent, and the Livestock Chairperson. Maryland 4-H is NOT permitted to give permission for 4-H members to stay overnight at fairs.)
- 13. Each livestock exhibitor is responsible for bringing his or her own straw or shavings and cleaning his or her stalls before leaving the fairgrounds. Violation of this and other rules may lead to forfeiture of premiums.

GENERAL RULES

- 1. One entry per class (except classes 102, 202 and 302.) Classes 102, 202, 302 may have 2 entries per exhibitor.
- 2. Cartoon characters (Sponge Bob, The Simpsons, etc.) and other well-known images should not be used on fair exhibits because they are copyrighted.

Booths and Banners:

- 1. Booths and banners may have a 4-H promotional theme of your choice or follow the current year's Maryland State Fair theme found on the State Fair website.
- 2. Booths will be placed on a table at the fair and don't need legs or a stand.

Pay close attention to the Maryland State Fair rules and specifications below.

Booths

Size and Construction:

- NEW booth dimensions: 36" W x 30" D x 16" H will be phased in.
- The sides must be in the shape of a right triangle using the following dimensions: 16"tall x 30"long/deep.
- Identification card must be typed not hand written. Font size minimum 16pt.
- Card should be (business card size) 2"x3.5" in size and displayed horizontally. Securely attached to the bottom board, on the right front corner. The ID card must include the Club/Chapter Name and the county. Missing ID Cards will result in score deduction.

Booth Details:

- Nothing in the booth may be taller than the sides of the booth where the item is placed.
- No Electrical hookups will be provided. If battery packs are used, they must be turned on when delivered and left on for the duration. Judges, Superintendents, 4-H members, volunteers, family members and/or other 4-H Staff will not be allowed to turn batteries on or off for entries prior to judging.
- Structure MUST be constructed of durable materials that will look good for the duration of the fair.
- Booth items MUST be securely fastened to prevent damage, loss or to prevent items from shifting if moved. Booths are often relocated after they are dropped off, if items shift due to poor design they will be left where they fall.
- Failure to comply with these instructions may cause the booth to be disqualified and not receive a premium.

Booths MUST Display:

- Booth Title
- Minimum of one OFFICIAL 4-H Clover or FFA crest must be displayed with the minimum size of 4 inches horizontal or vertical.
- Suggestions: Use readable font choices and sizes, make sure to use proper clover and crest in readable formats, colors and sizes. This is marketing/promotional display, make sure to highlight your organization. When displayed can we tell who is promoting this booth and what for? Be creative with placements of logos, text, graphics, and 3-dimensional items.

Banners

Size and Construction:

- Banner dimensions must be 50" wide and 38" tall. Failure to comply with dimensions will cause the banner to be disqualified and not receive a premium.
- Banner must be constructed to hang on a pole. The opening for the pole should to be a minimum of 3", and is included in the overall size of 38" long. Do not bring your own pole.
- Banners may be constructed of any type of durable material. Must be able to be folded or rolled.
- Appliqué and embroidery are suggested applications. The design must be on one side only.

Banners MUST Display:

- Banner Title
- Minimum of one OFFICIAL 4-H Clover or FFA crest must be displayed with a minimum height or width of 6 inches. 5. ID CARD:
- Identification card must be typed not hand written. Font size minimum 16pt.
- Card should be (business card size) 2"x3.5" in size and displayed horizontally, securely attached with safety pins, sewn, or glued on the back side of the banner on a bottom corner. The ID card must include the Club/Chapter Name and the county.
- Missing ID Cards will result in score deduction.

Your project for the year will not be complete, but you can show the progress of your project by describing what you have accomplished so far. You may include photos of yourself working with your project animal, etc. You may also include anticipated talks or exhibits and the date you plan to do them.

Note: A senior portfolio is not considered by judges to be a stand-alone record book because the amount of information in a portfolio is much less than in a record book and the two can't easily be compared. Senior members may choose to submit a record book and substitute the portfolio's resume in place of the summary record and the portfolio's essay in place of the 4-H story. (This is the standard practice in several counties.) Judges will want to review your project records and other documentation to better understand the work you have accomplished this year.

- 9. Basis for judging pickles; uniformity, texture, color, liquid, container, pack.
